The Host



Steve Robinson

Steve Robinson is an American radio manager, producer and executive producer. He has held senior management positions with numerous American radio stations, including WFMT and the WFMT Radio Network/Chicago, WBUR/Boston, WGBH/Boston, WCRB/Boston, KPFA/ Berkeley, WBGO/Newark, Vermont Public Radio and Nebraska Public Radio Network. Robinson served as general manager of the statewide Nebraska Public Radio Network (1990-2000) and WFMT and the WFMT Radio Network from 2000 until October 2016. A 50-year radio veteran, he has produced programs ranging from classical music documentaries to public affairs programs and has directed over 100 on-air pledge drives. In 1984, he co-founded AIR, the Association of Independents in Radio, a service organization to assist independent radio producers in the United States. Robinson wrote AIR's first two successful grants from the New York State Council on the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts. Throughout his career, Robinson has produced dozens of radio programs that have been heard throughout the world, including live broadcasts from Salzburg, Austria (on the occasion of Mozart's 250th birthday); Durbin, South Africa (for the world premiere for the opera, "Princess Magogo); Quebec City, Canada (for a live broadcast of Mahler's Symphony of a Thousand with 1000 performers); Jerusalem, Israel (for a broadcast from the Jerusalem International Chamber Music Festival); and has produced numerous live broadcasts from Chicago and throughout the U.S. He has worked with William Schuman, Elliott Carter, Charles Dodge, Roger Reynolds, Alan Hovhaness and other composers on programs about their music. In 2003, he created the daily classical music appreciation radio program, Exploring Music with Bill McGlaughlin. The series is carried by state networks throughout the world including Australia and China. At the WFMT Radio Network he created the first classical music radio exchange between the United States and China. In 2000, Robinson became the general manager of WFMT and the WFMT Radio Network. Founded in 1951, WFMT is considered as one of the most admired classical music stations in the U.S. and under his leadership many new programs were added to the local schedule, including Intro- ductions, Impromptu and others. Robinson worked on diversifying the programs of WFMT by expanding the amount of live broadcasting from the station. One of his most important initiatives at the WFMT Radio Network was the creation of Exploring Music with Bill McGlaughlin, in 2003. This daily, one-hour music appreciation program is heard on over 60 U.S. stations and has a weekly audience of over 400,000 unique listeners. The pro-gram is also heard in Australia, Guam, the Philippines and in Beijing. Initial funding for Exploring Music was provided by the National Endowment for the Arts with additional funding from individuals and foundations. The station under his leadership focused on live music by broadcasting a wide array of local Chicago groups and ensembles. In 2007, the Chicago Tribune named him "Chicagoan of the Year" in the arts. In 2015, he executed a cross-cultural broadcast relationship between America and China by exporting to China for the first time broadcasting concerts by the NY Philharmonic, LA Philharmonic, San Francisco Symphony, Dallas Symphony, Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall. He also arranged for concerts from the Shanghai Spring International Music Festival and the Shanghai Symphony Orchestra to be exported to the West with broadcasts in the U.S., Canada and Europe. In 2004 and again in 2010, Robinson created and produced two, live, 17hour fundraising campaigns involving all Chicago radio and TV stations to aid victims of the tsunami in the southeast and the earthquake in Haiti. Each campaign raised over \$3 million. Robinson received two Wesbury Award from the American Red Cross of Greater Chicago for the fundraising campaigns. In 2008, Robinson and Bill McGlaughlin received the Dushkin Award for Exploring Music with Bill McGlaughlin from the Music Institute of Chicago. He has received local and national awards for his work in Chicago, including the Champion Award from the Merit School of Music, the ASCAP/Deems Taylor Award for creative programming and others.

The Bayberry Quartet



Nurit Pacht Violin

Violinist NURIT PACHT was a top prize winner in international competitions including the Irving Klein International Music Competition in California and the Tibor Varga International Violin Competition in Switzerland. As a soloist she was featured in major world events such as the European conference for the inauguration of the Euro in Brussels and under the auspices of the European Commission and United Nations she toured the former Yugoslavia, during the cease-fire in 1996. In 2015, she performed for Pope Francis on his visit to New York and gave a State Department funded recital tour of Ukraine. She has collaborated with stage director Robert Wilson, choreographers such as Bill T. Jones and has worked closely with many of today's celebrated composers. She has toured as soloist with orchestras around the world including the Houston Symphony, the Pacific Symphony, the Rhode Island Philharmonic and the Israel Chamber Orchestra. The Israeli Composer Noam Sheriff dedicated the violin concerto "Dibrot" to her and she performed it in several prestigious venues of Israel. As a baroque violinist, she has a master's degree from Juilliard's Historical Performance program. Ms. Pacht has recorded for Nimbus Records and Toccata Classics.

Violinist STEFFANI KITAYAMA splits her time performing, teaching, and dancing with a small ballet company in Michi- gan. She holds performance degrees from the University of Cincinnati College Conservatory Music and Northwestern University where she studied with Won Bin Yim and Blair Milton. While residing in District of Columbia the past few years, she performed with the Grammy nominated Inscape Chamber Orchestra, the New Orchestra of Washington and various chamber music collaborations throughout the States. A passionate chamber musician, she has studied with some of the great quartet players, notably Mathias Tacke of the Vermeer Quartet and has performed in collaboration with Yo-Yo Ma, Simon Fischer, Peter Salaff, and members of the Cavani Quartet, Lincoln Trio and Artemis Quartet. As a teacher, she has taught in a variety of settings from public school outreach to group classes and private lessons. She currently maintains a private studio with her husband, Gabe Bolkosky in Ann Arbor, Michigan and teaches at institutes across the States and abroad.



Gabe Bolkosky

Violist GABE BOLKOSKY has performed and taught across the United States and abroad. Primarily a violinist, he performs a diverse repertory of classical and contemporary works with different collaborative artists from many genres of music making. Gabe released seven CDs that show his breadth as a musician focused in the areas of contemporary music, jazz and tango as well as traditional classical music. Over the last two decades, Gabe spent six years as Guest Artist at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor teaching violin and chamber music and as the Executive Director of The Phoenix Ensemble, a nonprofit organization dedicated to being a musical resource for artists and educational institutions. Gabe also directs PhoenixPhest! and PhoenixPhest! Grande, two amateur chamber music festivals held each May and August intent on creating an environment open to all levels and ages of musicians. Recently, he found- ed the organization, Musicians Take a Stand, encouraging musicians to hold concerts for humanitarian causes and raise money through social media platforms.



Laura Usiskin

Cellist LAURA USISKIN has performed throughout North America and Europe in such venues as the Kennedy Center, Alice Tully Hall, Palazzo Chigi Saracini (Italy), Weill Hall, and Barge Music. With a penchant for music both old and new, she worked as a Baroque cellist and has also premiered dozens of works as well as commissioned works in her name. In 2011, Usiskin founded the Montgomery Music Project, an El Sistema strings program for students in Montgomery, Alabama. The program has given intensive string instruction to hundreds of low-income children across three counties. Usiskin has held orchestral positions with the New Haven Symphony, Jacksonville Symphony, and Orchestra Iowa. In addition to the Bayberry String Quartet, Usiskin is a core member of the Atlanta-based new music group ensemble vim. She has served on the faculty at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, through which she founded the series "Chamber Music @ AEIVA," as well as Birmingham-Southern College. Usiskin graduated cum laude with a Bachelor of Arts in Neuroscience and Behavior from Columbia University, Master of Music from The Juilliard School, and Doctor of Musical Arts from the Yale School of Music, where she was awarded the Aldo Parisot Prize. She current- ly lives in Atlanta.

Vladimir Dyo Violin

Since his debut with the Kazakh State Symphony Orchestra at age 12, Vladimir Dyo has toured and performed at prestigious venues of the former USSR, Europe, Asia, and the United States, including Carnegie Hall, Walt Disney Hall, Seoul Arts Center, Rachmaninoff Hall, Tchaikovsky Hall, Column Hall, Queen Elizabeth Hall, KBS Hall, UNESCO, United Nations General Headquarters etc. His individual tone and personal approach to phrasing set him apart from

his peers. Critics write: "His mystic contour merged with the instrument and hypnotized the audience. Subtlety and flawlessness of Rachmaninoff's endlessly versatile music created such an emotional reaction with the audience that many had tears in their eyes..." (N. Zemlyakova, musicologist). "Dyo's Sarasate was dazzling." (Michael Church, BBC World Service). "Vladimir Dyo is a violinist who plays with incredible energy and electricity. His rendition of my LEX was spectacular. Throughout, Mr. Dyo's playing was elegant, subtle at times, imperious at others, dramatic, and remarkable." — Dr. David Cannata Since his debut with the Kazakh State Orchestra at the age of nine, Yevgeniy Dyo has performed at prestigious venues in the former Soviet Union, Europe, Asia, Canada, and the United States, including Carnegie Hall, Alice Tully Hall, Kimmel Center, Tchaikovsky Hall, Mozarteum Wiener Saal, Meyerson Hall, Astana Philharmonic Society Presidential Hall, Embassies of the Vatican and South Korea, and the United Nations General Headquarters. He has won numerous awards from foundations and national and international competitions, including the grand prize at the Shabyt International Chamber Music Competition, Astana, Kazakhstan, and the International Organization "New Names" Award, Moscow, Russia.





Violinist/Violist Joseph Kauffman has studied with Yayoi Numazawa of the Philadelphia Orchestra, James Lyon and Max Zorin of The Pennsylvania State University, and Dr. Eduard Schmieder of Temple University. Kauffman holds violin performance degrees from Penn State (BM) University and Temple University (MM). He is currently a DMA candidate at Temple University. Kauffman has performed in many of the most prestigious concert halls throughout the world including Tchaikovsky Hall, Disney Hall, Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, the Kimmel Center, the Mariinsky Theatre, and the Kennedy Center amongst others. Kauffman received 1st Prize in the MTNA chamber music competition, and was the winner of the Beene, Kroulik, and Brewster solo competitions. He was awarded the Albert Tashjian and Max Aronoff Prizes by Temple University for excellence in performance and teaching, and the creative achievement award by Penn State University for his memorable performances. He has performed as a soloist with the PSU Phil- harmonic, Williamsport Chamber Orchestra, Temple Symphony Orchestra, and others.



lgor Zubkovsky

Igor Zubkovsky started playing cello in his native Russia. He first appeared as a soloist with the Minsk State Philharmonic Orchestra at the age of twelve, performing the Haydn C Major Cello Concerto. Later, he studied at the Moscow Conservatory with Natalia Shakhovskaya, the Gold Medalist of the 1962 Tchaikovsky Competition. Mr. Zubkovsky won top prizes at international competitions, including the International Cello Competition in Minsk, Belarus (II prize), and the Tansman Competition in Lodz, Poland (Grand Prix). As a member of "The Brahms Trio" in Moscow, he won 2nd Prize at the Trapani, Italy and 1st Prize at the Weimar, Germany International Chamber Music Competitions. With a remarkable record of performances, awards and academic distinctions, Mr. Zubkovsky was awarded a full scholarship to the Peabody Conservatory of Music where he earned a Graduate Performance Diploma. Since 2003, Mr. Zubkovsky has been a member of the Kennedy Center Opera House Orchestra, and continues to perform extensively as a soloist and chamber musician. He has appeared at Merkin Concert Hall in New York, at the prestigious Newport Music Festival, and has performed recitals in Massachusetts and at the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC. Live recordings of those concerts are frequently broadcast on TV and over the Internet. A founding member of The Lehner String Quartet, he was also a cellist of the critically-acclaimed Veronika String Quartet in 2021-2022.

Jennifer Savage received her Master from the Manhattan School of Music, New York, studying piano performance with Arkady Aronov and Efrem Briskin under the Elva van Gelder Memorial and Constance Keene piano scholarship. She studied at the MSM Precollege with Efrem Briskin and at the Levine School of Music with Dr. Anna Ouspenskaya. An avid performer, Jennifer has appeared as a soloist with the Virtuosi Brunensis Orchestra and at prestigious venues such as the Kennedy Center in Washington, DC, Carnegie Weill Recital Hall, Kauffman Center's Merkin Hall, historical Palazzo dei Priori in Perugia Italy, the DiCapo Opera Theater in New York, and the Kimmel Center in Philadelphia. Jennifer has won numerous competitions, both in solo and chamber music, performing at Embassy of Italy, Mexican Cultural Institute, Lyceum in Alexandria, featured on Cable TV: A Holiday Recital, the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg, Netherlands Embassy, Alden Theater Music Friends Concert, as well as giving a lecture-concert in Wuhan, China.

Jayson Martinez



Founder and Conductor of the New Jersey Guitar Orchestra

Guitarist and educator Mr. Jayson Martínez is recognized as the first guitar major in the history of the prestigious Arts High School in Newark, NJ, the nation's first high school of the visual and performing arts. Now, as Director of Guitar Studies at his Alma Mater, Mr. Martínez has garnered several awards, including the 2018 Teacher of the Year Award and a nominee for the GRAMMY Music Educator's Award. His students have also won several awards, and have been featured in a multitude of venues across the country. These include performing for the United States Secretary of Education Miguel Cardona in Washington DC, NAfME All-National Festivals, and opening for the Grammy Award duo Rodrigo y Gabriela.

Jayson attended New Jersey City University, where he studied under the tutelage of Dr. Ana María Rosado, and earned degrees in Music Education (B.A.), Music Performance (M.Mus.), and Educational Supervision and Administration (M.EdLd.). He was a featured soloist who performed for many renowned classical guitarists, including Jason Vieaux, Ben Verdery, Roland Dyens, and William Kanengiser. As a doctoral candidate at Liberty University, he is conducting extensive research projects in the music education field.

Mr. Martínez serves as the New Jersey Music Educators Association (NJMEA) Chairman for Guitar Education, Director of the NJMEA Honors Guitar Ensemble, and National Association for Music Education (NAfME) Eastern Division Representative for the Council of Guitar Education. He is also an adjunct Professor of Guitar Studies at Kean University.

An established classical guitarist, Mr. Martínez served as the concertmaster for the renowned New York City Classical Guitar Orchestra, whom performed at Carnegie Hall in 2019 as part of the Aaron Shearer Centennial Celebration. In addition, he is featured in podcasts for Bill Swick's "Guitarists in the Classroom" series and for TopMusic.co.

In 2021, Mr. Martinez founded the New Jersey Guitar Orchestra, where he also serves as conductor. In 2022, the NJGOwas featured in NYC Merkin Hall, performing with the United States Guitar Orchestra.

Staying true to his roots, he is also the owner of Tremolo Music Studio LLC in Clifton, NJ, where he provides music education to aspiring musicians of all ages.

Composers



Jana Skarecky Composer

Jana Skarecky is a Canadian contemporary classical composer of vocal and instrumental music – for solo instruments, chamber groups, solo voice, choir, and orchestra. Jana was born in Prague, in the Czech Republic, on November 11, 1957. She came to Canada with her family in 1968. In 1980 she received a Bachelor of Music degree in Honors Composition from Wilfrid Laurier University in Waterloo, Ontario, where her primary composition teacher was Barrie Cabena. She also studied piano with Erhard Schlenker, French horn with Felix Acevedo, and organ with Nixon Mc- Millan and Jan Overduin. She is an Associate of the Royal Conservatory of Music, Toronto, in piano performance. In 1987 she received a Master of Music degree in composition from the University of Sydney, Australia, where she studied with Peter Sculthorpe, Jana's compositions cover a wide spectrum of instrumental and vocal resources. Her music has an expressive lyricism, and integrates a variety of influences from Gregorian chant to Czech folk song. Her compositions have been performed in North America, Europe, Australia, New Zealand, and Japan. The Lehner String Quartet of Washington DC previously performed her "Australian Images" in 2021. The piece, composed in homage to her former composition teacher Australian composer Peter Sculthorpe. evokes Jana's responses to several iconic landmarks of the Australian landscape. Mezzo-soprano Maria Soulis premiered Jana's composition Presences in Toronto in 2022 and New Year Carol in 2024. In 2020 soprano Clarisse Tonigussi premiered the monodrama The Path before Me (with text and music by Jana Skarecky) in Waterloo and online. In celebration of Jana's 60th birthday in 2017 a concert of her compositions and an exhibition of her art took place in Toronto – Time Tributaries, Music and Art by Jana Skarecky. The premiere of The Land Sings for two bass clarinets, percussion & organ, commissioned by NUMUS, premiered in 2017 in Waterloo, Ontario. Her orchestral work Streams opened Hammerson Hall of the Living Arts Centre in Mississauga, Ontario. She loves writing for the voice, both solo and choral works, and setting poetry to music — for example, Green and Gold for soprano and piano (settings of poetry by P.K. Page, toured across Canada in 2017 by Clarisse Tonigussi), commissioned for the Wider Boundaries of Daring poetry conference (Windsor), and the choral work Song of Life, commissioned for Then, Now, & Beyond... a Festival of Music by Women (Ottawa). Jana's choral setting of the poem Back to Babylon by Viggo Mortensen was premiered in New Zealand in 2012. Her one-woman opera Emily, the Way You Are was well received by audiences. Some of her choral music is published by Alliance Publications (Wisconsin) and available from Hal Leonard. Jana Skarecky is an Associate Composer of the Canadian Music Centre. She has been Chair of the Association of Canadian Women Composers, and has served on the National Council of the Canadian League of Composers. Jana is also active as a visual artist primarily painting with acrylics, and as a photographer. She often composes and paints in parallel, finding that the two media interact and lead in new directions. She teaches piano and music theory and examines for the Royal Conservatory of Music. She has sung with the Contemporary Singers in Sydney (Australia) and the St. Mary Magdalene's Gallery Choir in Toronto. She is the translator of The Foundations of Modern Harmony by Karel Janeček from Czech into English (WLU Press 2024). Joel Feigin Composer

Joel Feigin is an internationally performed composer, whose operas, chamber, orchestral, and piano works have been widely praised for their "very strong impact, as logical in musical design as they are charged with emotion and drama." (Opera Magazine). Feigin's first opera, Mysteries of Eleusis, written on a Guggenheim Fellowship, commissioned and premiered by Theatre Cornell, was later featured at the Moscow Conservatory (Russia), and a year later repeated at the Russian American Operatic Festival. A second opera, Twelfth Night, commissioned by Long Leaf Opera, has been seen in three productions, in North Carolina, Chicago, and southern California. It has been praised for "many striking passages, hushed and shimmering for lovers. sparkling and cheeky for the comic figures." The recent California production "brought the audience spontaneously to their feet. Feigin's magical score is key to that exuberant response.... It's a sleeper that deserves to be in the repertory of major opera houses." (Bravo California). Excerpts from Twelfth Night have also been presented in the New Works Sampler at the Opera America Conference, 2006, and on New York City Opera's VOX 2003 Showcase. Feigin's current opera-in-progress, Outcast at the Gate, has had two highly success- ful workshops, at the Colburn School in Los Angeles, featuring the Brightwork En- semble and the vocal ensemble HEX, and in New York by The Center for Contem- porary Opera. After seeing the New York workshop, critic James Grant termed it a "wonderful new opera... contemporary, but with echoes of the distant past...a closely observed mirror of our time". Instrumental commissions include orchestral, chamber and piano works such as Aviv: Concerto for Piano and Chamber Orchestra. written for Yael Weiss on a Fromm Commission, and heard on Feigin's widely praised. latest CD, Music for Chamber Orchestra (Toccata Classics). David DeBoor Canfield writes that "regard- less of the style in which he is writing, Feigin retains his unique compositional voice. This music demands to be heard", and Ken Meltzer finds it "an immensely gratifying experience.... It's wonderful to hear a contemporary composer who embraces varying styles and modes of expression without a hint of pastiche, and in a totally convincing and communicative fashion." (Fanfare Magazine) The CD Lament Amid Silence (MSR) presents a large-scale work for solo viola, a consort of six violas. and solo piano, written for violist Helen Callus and her studio at the University of California, and which Ms. Callus has termed "one of the most beau- tiful and dramatic pieces in the literature for the viola". The recording contains two piano pieces played by Feigin, one of which, Meditation I, has been termed "an as yet unrecognized masterpiece of contemporary piano literature...Feigin is an excel- lent and most sensitive pianist" (Mark Greenfest, SoundWord Sight). Feigin's work is also heard on the two-CD set. Transience (Albany), which has been termed as a "comprehensive survey of Feigin's sincere, communicative, and deeply felt music" by critic Hubert Culot. Pianist Margaret Mills commissioned Feigin's Variations on Empty Space, and included it, in addition to Feigin's Four Meditations from Dogen, on her Cambria CD, Meditations and Overtones. Concerts devoted solely to Feigin's music have been given in Russia and Armenia, and in New York at Merkin Hall and Lincoln Center's Bruno Walter Auditorium. Two all-Feigin concerts were presented in Moscow during Feigin's year on a Senior Fulbright Fellowship at Moscow Conserva- tory, at the Conservatory, and at the Scriabin Museum. Dr. Feigin studied with Nadia Boulanger at Fontainebleau and with Roger Sessions at The Juilliard School. His many honors include a Mellon Fellowship, a Guggenheim Fellowship, Senior Fulbright Fellowship, and the Edward A. Dickson Emeriti Professorship of the University of California, Santa Barbara. The Joel Feigin Collection at the New York Public Library of the Performing Arts at Lincoln Center opened in 2011. Feigin is Professor Emeritus of Composition at the University of California, Santa Barbara, A long-time student of Zen Buddhist, Feigin studied for many years with the late Sojun Mel Weitsman Roshi. Livia Teodorescu-Ciocanea Composer Livia Teodorescu-Ciocanea is a Romanian composer and pianist. Professor PhD for composition, forms, analysis and stylistics at the National University of Music Bucharest. Her music explores spectralism, neo-impressionism and postmodernism to a powerful lyric and dramatic effect. She held the title of Adjunct Associate Professor (Research) at the Sir Zelman Cowen School of Music, at Monash University Australia, between 2017 and 2021, currently being Affiliate Professor. In 2022 she was elected a member of the European Academy of Sciences and Arts based in Salzburg. For a brief period, in 2021, she undertook the position of artistic director of the Bucharest National Opera. Since 2021 she has been a Price artist. Teodorescu studied composition with Myriam Marbe (bachelor degree). Anatol Vieru (doctoral studies) and Margaret Lucy Wilkins (UK, doctoral studies). She is a member of the Union of Composers and Musicologists in Romania, and her music has been performed in the USA. Australia. Hong Kong, Indonesia, Japan and across Europe, and by leading orchestras in Romania, including the George Enescu Philharmonic, National Radio and Chamber Radio Orchestras and the Orchestra of Bucharest National Opera. She has been awarded a variety of prestigious prizes for her work as a composer, including those of the Union of Composers and Musicologists in Romania in 2001 (for the ballet Le rouge et le noir), 2003, 2006, 2009 and 2016. In 2008 she was awarded the 'George Enescu' Romanian Academy Award for Romulus and Remus (a trio for two violins and piano) and, in the same year, the National Order 'Cultural Merit' (Knight Grade). She has written a large number of works for various ensembles, vocal and symphonic. Her major works include: The Lady with the dog (2015 rev. 2021) after Chekhov, opera in 4 acts; Le Rouge et le Noir (2000) ballet in 3 acts after Stendhal, Archimedes Symphony (2011 rev. 2017), Rite for enchanting the Air - Flute(s) concerto (1998, premiered by Pierre-Yves Artaud) and Mysterium tremendum - cantata for mezzo-soprano and orchestra (2016). Her scores have been published by Editura muzicală Bucharest, ArsPublica (Italy) and Hoeflich (Germany). Commercial recordings of her music have featured on Toccata Classics: TOCC0448, TOCC0595, TOCC0668 (United Kingdom), Move Records (Australia), and Electrecord (Romania). The Toccata album Livia Teodorescu Cio- canea - Le Rouge et le Noir was included in the Want List (Top 5 selection Fanfare Magazine) for the year 2021 by Colin Clarke. Her Archimedes Symphony featured on the Toccata album Livia Teodorescu Ciocanea - Orchestral works was ranked first in the top 10 Best classical music of the year 2023 in the American Journal The Absolute Sound and in the Top 5 selection for Fanfare Magazine 2023 by reviewer Peter Burwasser. In 2008 she won an Australian Federal Government grant - the Endeavour Award Postdoctoral Research Fellowship - which was undertaken at Monash University. She has presented conferences in the UK (1996, 1999), Norway (2005) USA (2003, 2005, 2006) and Australia (2008). She has been a visiting lecturer at the University of Illinois-Champaign, USA, 2006, Oslo Academy of Music (2005) and Monash University Australia (2008). Livia Teodorescu is also a concert pianist and she worked for the Bucharest National Opera as accompanist between 1985-2001. She studied piano with Ana Pitis and Ioana Minei and attended the piano master-classes given by Zoltán Kocsis and Imre Rohmann in the 'Bartók Seminar' in Szombathely, Hungary. As a concert pianist she has performed many classical and modern works of the solo and duo repertoire and has accompanied numerous vocal and instrumental recitals. She has played solo recitals (with Chopin, Debussy, Beethoven, Liszt and Schubert among the composers featured) in Romania, Italy and France, and concertos with several Romanian orchestras.



Tatiana Mikova Composer

Tatiana Mikova is an eclectic, multi-award-winning Czech classical and film music composer based in London. She has composed concert works for symphony orchestras, chamber ensembles, and solo instruments, alongside numerous film scores. Gaining international acclaim for her "Spanish Serenade" and "Fantasia on Moravian Themes" (performed by the renowned Czech Nonet). Mikova's music has been featured on Performance Today (American Public Media). Classical California KUSC/ Los Angeles, KDFC/San Francisco, and other stations worldwide. After winning a Gold Medal at the Global Music Awards (USA) in 2019 for two nonets, her orchestral piece "Sinfonietta for Orchestra" won 2nd prize at the IV. Best European Composer competition in Austria. Following its premiere in New York in 2021, her String Quartet "In Modo Lidico" was performed by the Lehner Quartet at Carnegie Hall in 2024. As a highly versatile film music composer and orchestrator, Mikova has written numerous scores for feature films, shorts, and documentaries in a wide variety of styles and instrumentations. Her film scores have received over 30 international awards and nominations. including Best Score at the Los Angeles Film Awards, Best Score at the New York Film Awards, Best Composer at the Toronto Film Magazine Fest, Best Score at the Oniros Film Awards in New York, Masters of Cinema in Italy, Rome International Movie Awards, EdiPlay International Film Festival in France and Singapore, and Best Music at the Horror Film Awards in New York. Her film music has been performed by The City of Prague Philharmonic Orchestra and recorded at the iconic Smecky Music Studios with conductors Mario Klemens, Leos Svarovsky, and Jan Chalupecky. Mikova's film music scores were featured in the "100 Women Film Composers" Spotify playlist, and British film critic Mark Kermode included her music in the radio program "Classical Music for Modern Life." Mikova holds a Master's degree in Music Composition for Film and Television from the London College of Music, University of West London. She studied instrumental composition at Oxford University (OUDCE) and classical music composition and instrumentation under Professor Milan Jira and Moisés R. Sánchez Miranda. She also received a scholarship for a Film Scoring Workshop with Hollywood composer Christopher Young. Mikova further enriched her education by conducting interdisciplinary research, which included directing and producing a short film about deaf musicians. She also completed courses in opera, musique concrète, and experimental sound through Harvard University and Columbia University in New York.



Francis Schwarz Composer

Francis Schwartz was born in the United States in 1940 and grew up in Texas where he studied with the eminent pianist Patricio Gutierrez. He received both B.S. and M.S degrees from The Juilliard School in New York City and subsequently was awarded a Ph.D. with highest honors from the University of Paris. Dr. Schwartz was Dean of Humanities of the University of Puerto Rico where he also held major academic and administrative positions during his 33 year career at the prestigious Caribbean institution. He was decorated by the French government and awarded the Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et Lettres. His music is regularly performed around the world and he is particularly noted for his innovative music theater works that frequently incorporate the attending public as active participants in the performance. His works have been performed at Lincoln Center, Carnegie Hall, The Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., Centre Pompidou de Paris, The Reina Sofía Concert Hall among other prestigious venues throughout the world.



Ahmed Karam Composer

Ahmed Karam is a New York-based composer, conductor and guitarist who seeks to bridge the gap between folk music and contemporary styles. Through years of music making in local ensembles, Ahmed wrote for a wide variety of genres, including electronic dance, rock bands and singer-songwriter. Recently, Ahmed composed the music for a short film, I Love Anna, directed by Alyssa Mullings, and premiered in October, 2021 at the REEL Recovery Film Festival and Symposium in Los Angeles's Laemle NoHo and New York's Village East Cinema. He is currently slated to begin his masters in Oscar Bettison's studio at the Peabody Conservatory on a full scholarship. Ahmed has studied composition at The Juilliard School, receiving his certificate in composition from the Evening Division, while he received his bachelor's degree in Fine Arts from Saint Peter's University. Working directly with students, she guides musicians towards developing healthy movement practices, preventing injuries, and promoting long, sustainable careers. Throughout her career, Christina has received numerous awards for her contributions to the world of classical music, solidifying her place as a leading concert violist, scholar, and advocate, including the Gilman International Study Scholarship, the National Federation of Music Clubs Scholarship, the National Federation of the Blind Pearson Scholarship, and in 2022, she was named a Pat Tillman Scholar for her continuing service to the music community. Be- yond the stage, she remains deeply involved in philanthropic endeavors, supporting initiatives that aim to make classical music accessible to diverse audiences. Christina's dedication exceptional skill led her to study under the mentorship of esteemed violists Joel Belgique, Kenji Bunch, and Basil Vendryes. Currently, she is completing her Doctorate in Viola Performance and Literature as an Illinois Distinguished Fellow at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign with Liz Freivogel of the Jupiter Quartet and is the Editor for the Journal of the American Viola Society. She continues to captivate audiences with her soul-stirring performances while contributing to the cultural tapestry of classical music.

Sophie Dunér is a Swedish singer, improviser, and composer who travels and performs internationally. Her performances span from the infamous 'CBGB's' to the '13th & 14th Annual Charles Mingus Festival' in NYC, the 'Buenos Aires Festival de Música Contemporánea La Plata.' and the 'Festival O/Modernt' in Sweden. She has been a composer in residence with the US-based new music group 'Present Music.' She has also studied at the Stockhausen summer courses in Ger- many, awarded a grant from The Swedish Arts Council. Apart from musicians already mentioned, Sophie has collaborated with Guy Livingston, Francis Schwartz, Paul Clarvis, Don McCaslin, Guillermo Klein, Aaron Gold- berg, Dick Griffin, Mark Turner, Seamus Blake, Steve Hamilton, Daniel Schnyder, Eric Segnitz, Gerry Brown, Craig Harris, Steve Swell, José Luís Greco, Hugo Ticciati, Valery Ponomarev, Tommy Campbell, Sébastién Dubé, Eleonor Sandresky, and others. Previous CDs include her solo album 'Strictly Business' produced by Darren Alli- son (2022), 'The City of Dizzy' together with electric cellist Jeremy Harman (2016), 'Songs Eclectic' together with guitarist Gene Pritsker (2020), and 'The Rain in Spain' with guitarist Rory Stuart, bassist Matt Penman, and percussionist Kahlil Kwame Bell (CIMP). Sophie has also recorded a duo CD with the late iconic avant-garde jazz bassist Dominic Duval Sr (previously in free jazz legend Cecil Taylor's band) in 2014, which is finally set for release in 2024. Her new CD 'Modern Mingus' together with Bertram Lehman on percussion and electronics is also to be released in 2024. Sophie was recently awarded SKR 50,000 (\$5,000) as a composer from The Swedish Performance Rights Organization. Last year, she participated as one of the fe- male composers contributing to Clarice Assad's composition 'TAPESTRY,' as part of 'The Mosaic Project,' premiered in November 2023 in San Diego during the 'Mainly Mozart Festival' directed by Anne-Marie McDermott. 

Although she didn't play them again for a while, the memory endured. After retiring, she reignited her passion for castanets by taking a beginner's course. Her natural talent led her to pursue advanced training, when she met Teresa Laiz. Over 5 years, she honed her skills and performed at various events, including the 1st and 2nd Edition of the International Castanet Competition in Madrid. Her dedication and talent landed her a spot in the Madrid Castanet Choir, directed by Teresa Laiz, where she continues to captivate audiences with her
